






The Sierra Nevada Alliance

- January through November









Watershed Restoration and Assessment Projects and Results:


Types of SNAP watershed Restoration Projects include:

- Fuels Reduction


From 2007 to August of 2010 the SNAP program has restored over 6,488 acres of critically important Sierra Watershed and monitored over 700 sites in the Sierra for a wide array of parameters.

From 2007-August of 2010 the SNAP program has educated more than 52,800 people through outreach efforts, presentations and service learning projects.

From 2007 to August of 2010 the SNAP program has recruited more than 5,230 volunteers to complete service projects in their local watershed.

From 2007-August of 2010 SNAP members have received 68 donations totaling \$27,399 for their service projects.
